110 entries, no mistakes. Favourite clues: 'Like dressing for fish, left off? Stale crumbs!' for (G)EMONY, and 'Beef piece? Play about, rolling it, ignoring recipe' for TOPSID(E). This was a tough puzzle, clearly, by its very nature, but there were no complaints on that score. It also didn't help that it wasn't entirely clear which word you were required to clue, and I blame myself for this, though very few made the wrong choice by picking the excluded PRAISE. I simply failed to spot this in advance, and when (too late) the ambiguity was pointed out to me I tried to make things clearer by means of adding later clarification and extending the closing date, but I still feel sorry that any misunderstanding arose. Also it appears that the Holmes quotation may have been omitted from more recent editions of the *ODQ*. I have the second, third and fourth editions on my shelves, and it's in all of those. Sometimes you just can't win!

On top of everything else, INTERCHANGING was a bit of a brute to clue, though most rose to the occasion splendidly. Those quoted above show just what can be done with unpromising material. I always try to pick clue words which seem to offer a variety of approaches, but since I haven't time to clue these myself in advance, I may misjudge them from time to time.
