Comments

125 entries, no mistakes that I spotted. I'm sorry that I completely overlooked the fact that I had set the same clue word before, for No. 2,226 about ten years ago. Those that spotted this were characteristically generous about my memory lapse. I did not refer back to the earlier slip, so I can't say how many reused their earlier clues. In the circumstances I decided to award prizes etc as usual, but not to include these in the annual honours list, which will be extended by an extra month to include 13 competitions (one per month plus one at Christmas). I also mysteriously gave the wrong closing date for this competition, but I don't think anyone was seriously misled and I corrected my mistake as soon as this was possible. All of which was a pity for the Christmas comp.

Only four of my own clues were chosen as favourites this month, far fewer than usual, the winner being 'Thesp in Paris seen making comeback in live broadcast' for LUVVIE.

A couple of regular competitors picked me up on a comment I made in a recent slip (No. 2,733), criticizing the phrase 'total chaos/shambles' to indicate anagrams of 'total'. This was fair comment as far as 'total chaos' is concerned but not in the case of 'total shambles' where 'shambles' could be read as an intransitive verb and therefore acceptable as an anagram indicator. I'm sorry I overlooked this.
